




Major upgrades to the elevator were completed.





























### 2022 (UNAUDITED) REVENUES

- 1. Provincial Funding \$8810
- 2. Municipal Funding \$180,157
- 3. Grants \$15,588
- 4. Self Generated Funds \$5856
- 5. Donations \$4025



The majority of our funding is provided by the Municipality of Stirling-Rawdon. The Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport is responsible for administering the Public Libraries Act, and statutory grants under the Act including the Public Library Operating, Pay Equity, and First Nation Salary Supplement Grants Program. The Ontario Library Service (OLS), through Provincial funding, reimburses the library 100% of our connectivity costs and also provides the library with a rebate on all Interlibrary loan parcels shipped out each year. We were thrilled to receive a \$500 grant from the International Dyslexia Association to purchase decodable children's books and a \$12,500 grant from The Commonwell Mutual Insurance Group to establish a Makerspace Centre in the Children's Department! Self Generated Funds are brought in through daily library services such as printing, faxing, book sales, and overdue fines. We are always so grateful for the support we receive from our patrons and community clubs and organizations each year. A very special thank you to The Stirling Legion Branch 228, The Stirling Rotary Club, The Stirling Co-op Nursery, Nancy Snowdon, the Stirling Book Club, Mirmil Products, and everyone else who supported the library in some way or another throughout the year.

### 2022 (UNAUDITED) EXPENDITURES

- 1. Salaries/Benefits \$150554
- 2. Library Materials \$9602
- 3. General Expenses \$7556
- 4. Building, Utilities & Insurance \$23920
- 5. Membership, Licensing & Dues \$4469



Salaries naturally accounted for the majority of our expenditures at the library. Circulating library materials such as books, DVDs, and magazines totaled roughly \$9600 and other general expenses including supplies, programming costs postage, telephone, internet, computer support etc. cost the library approximately \$7550. Building costs included maintenance, repairs, elevator service, heating, hydro, insurance, alarm monitoring, and annual inspections. Subscribing to memberships to the Federation of Ontario Public Libraries, Overdrive, Ancestry, Joint Automation Server Initiative (our circulation system), Access Copyright, The Large Print Pool, Vita Toolkit (Stirling-Rawdon Past and Present) and staff training and personal development totaled about \$4470.

Special purchases that were made this year, primarily through fundraising and grants included LeapFrog tablets for the kids, a new art hanging system in the Art Gallery, new-to-us shelving for our revised Local History area, a Cricut press for future fundraising and marketing products, decodable books, a laminator for patron use, Storytime accessories, and new branding for the library including a new logo and outdoor sandwich sign.
